

The 1st period at Camp Le-wis-Jer-son has now come to an end. On August 2nd, 277 Scouts invaded the quiet woodlands of camp. This plus our regular staff and volunteer leaders rounded out the total to nearly 340 persons in camp. This is the largest single group ever to be in camp at one time.

Building at Camp this year has progressed because of the success of the Camp Expansion Fund drive carried on in our Council last year. We have greatly improved our facilities at Camp this summer. The dining hall, office, shower house, staff cabins, and department areas were rebuilt and re-equipped. All of this was done through the efforts of the people of our Council. Without their wonderful cooperation we couldn't have begun.

Our Order of the Arrow lodge inducted 17 new members into this National Brotherhood of Scout Follower Candidates to the ideal of cheerful service to others. We also hope that some more sportsmen and their troops will begin picking up the idea of chartering a troop and coming up here at Camp Makadama.
