## Lodge Sends Delegates to National Convention in Indiana

NOAC – the National Order of the Arrow Conference, held this year at the University of Indiana, is an almost indescribable experience. First there is the size of the group – 7300 Arrowmen from all over the United States. They fill the Bobby Knight-made-famous Basketball arena – 7300 scouts and scouters, with their sashes – 7300 folks with Lodge patches and shared OA experiences. There was even one group representing OA Lodges serving members on military bases throughout Europe and North Africa!

Then there is Indiana University itself...the campus is large, but once you find your way on foot, you can begin to comprehend its scale. It was best to abandon the car and hike to all of the events. We all stayed in various dorms throughout the campus and ate our meals in the dorm's cafeteria.

Some have likened this event to a Jamboree – however it is not a true analogy since this is both a business meeting and a gathering of like-minded people. Everyone takes classes on hundreds of topics in the morning. In the afternoon, much like the Jamboree, there is wide variety of activities. You can play sports, go to clinics on Native American regalia, and visit workshops or even trade patches. The emphasis is on having fun and socializing.

Another part of the NOAC experience is to meet the many people who serve the Lodge on other levels. There are National and Section level people, most of whom we rarely see, but feel the power of their work. For instance, the National group has been working on a 5 year strategic plan for the OA, which they unveiled at this conference. (See Advisor's corner for more details)

The heat was oppressive...but it didn't keep our spirits down. Our Lodge was well represented by newly elected Lodge Chief Garrett Wilson, Andy Hoose, Danny Clarke, Matt Cleveland, Mick Lee, Joe Re, Pat Riggs, Steve

## Andy Stone's OA Lingo

**OA:** The OA is the abbreviation for the *Order of the Arrow*

**Whip:** Is the Whippoorwill or Lodge newsletter sent 4 times per year

**Whippoorwill:** A bird that is our Lodge's totem, it is on your OA flap and can be heard periodically at camp Ma-ka-ja-wan

**Regalia:** Regalia is native American apparel, crafts, or costumes, it is the proper politically correct terminology

**Conclave:** A conclave is an OA gathering taking place for many reasons including **NOAC:** The National Order of the Arrow Conference, which was during the end of August at Indiana University. This conference is held every 2 years. It is when members of every lodge get together for a week of training, fun, and fellowship and is the OA's equivalent to a National Jamboree

**Chapter:** A Chapter is similar to a District. Our lodge has 3 chapters which coincide with the 3 Districts of our council. The Aptakasic chapter is associated with the Aptakasic District, Yakaway Chapter is associated with the North Star District, and Namichani chapter is associated with the Potawotomi District. The Chapters are the heart and soul of our Lodge and are the best way to get active since they offer many more positions and opportunities for new members.

**Exec Board:** The Executive Board is the group of lodge level committee heads that meets once a month at the Exec board meetings to take care of Lodge business.

**Key 5:** Is the group of the 5 elected Lodge officers including the Lodge chief, Vice Chief of Committees, Vice Chief of Chapters, Secretary and Treasurer.

It sets the strategic course for all local Lodges to follow. To summarize briefly, the emphasis for the next five years will be: Service, Leadership and Financial support to councils.

We have been known for years as the premiere service organization to scouting. This continues to be our strength, but there are plans to expand our charter beyond scouting to offer our services to other local community organizations as well.

The OA is a scout run organization and we strive to teach our leaders the same leadership skills that are taught in the Troop. This trend will continue, providing OA leaders with multiple opportunities to practice their skills.

The newest, and perhaps most challenging goal, is help provide financial support to our Council. Boy Scouts, like so many other not for profit organizations, needs to build a stronger financial foundation in order to remain vital. To help keep Scouting vital, the National OA Committee is asking Lodges to find ways to help provide financial support to our local Council.

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
