This past summer we completed all of the major construction to the re-furbished OA Bowl. We have two major teams working over the Memorial Day Conclave and Steve Silca led a group of 15 volunteers who worked the week just before camp started. This summer, at the Vigil Fire, we formally re-dedicated the bowl and recognized Charles Gribble, Camp Director when the bowl was first built, for allowing the staff to build a special ceremonial bowl. In the 70's and 80', the bowl was dramatically reshaped in the form of a upside down turtle and now, we have added erosion protection and seating for 1500. We have built a small remembrance area thanking all of the people who have worked on the bowl. There is a plaque on a display panel just at the top of the trail leading into the bowl. Thanks to all who have helped us with this project over the past three years.

### Dues Increase Notice:

Beginning in January 2006 our annual dues will increase to \$11.00. This is to keep pace with the dues increase that National is charging our membership. This action was voted on by the Key 5 and the LEC and will apply to all Arrowmen. Last year, we also moved to a January 1 – December 31 fiscal year. National has asked Councils to collect money only for that fiscal year. That means dues for 2006 must be paid in 2006. We encourage everyone to pay before the end of March.

Also, another change from the past, new Ordeal members (that is members called out in the summer of 2005) must pay for 2006 dues, to remain in compliance with the new accounting rules. You will notice that the fee for new Ordeals was reduced this past summer to cover only a portion of the year (summer to December of 2005). Everyone is on the same dues schedule now. So basically, pay your dues for 2006 in 2006! Everyone pays \$11.

Finally, when paying your dues, please use the special 2006 Dues form (available on line). It will greatly help us manage our accounts.
