As I write this, the question of merger of the Evanston and North Shore Councils has yet to be decided. Assuming that the merger does go thru, we will have an interesting and unique experience ahead coordinating two lodges (maybe someday one lodge?) into the "Onward Arrowman" Program.

Speaking of "Onward Arrowman", how about thinking ahead to next August and the 54th Anniversary National Conference? The details are elsewhere in this issue. I do want to say that we will be selecting delegates, not taking just anyone who applies. This policy has been approved by both the OA Executive Committee and the Council Camping and Activities Committee. Applications will be available in December.

Another part of the "Onward Arrow-man" Plan is a national goal to have at least 50% of our membership Brotherhood; right now the figure is 37%. Brotherhood Honor is just what the name implies - a brother who has shown that he continues to be worthy to wear the Arrow, in short, a full-fledged member of our Brotherhood. If you are not now Brothhood (and are eligible), please show your support of the Order by becoming Brotherhood. (The 1968 OA Handbook lists the requirements; but you can also contact Jud Cooley, Membership Chairman, for all the details.)

Lodge patches are now available thru George Econ, Quartermaster, or thru me. By the time you receive this, Lodge neckerchiefs will also be available. A final comment: one main purpose of the OA is to promote Scout Camping.
This is best done in the troops, where the boys are. If you think I am stating the obvious, consider this: How many OA members do you know who took the lead in bringing their own troops to camp last summer? Did you? Do you know that we are right now looking for older OA members who have been to camp Wabaningo to assist the Camping Committee in telling all Scouts about Camp?

ALL LODGES ARE URGED TO ATTEND INDIANA ARROW CONFERENCE IN '69

Every lodge will want to be represented at the bienneal national conference at Indiana University in 1969. Plans are now under way to make this the most significant training conference in the history of the Order.

Total attendance at the 54th Anniversary National Conference, August 23-26,1969, will be limited to 4,000 members. A quota system has been established in order to give each lodge an opportunity to be represented.

Space will be held for five boys and one adult adviser per lodge until March 1, 1969. After that date -- if space is available -- reservations will be accepted on a first come, first serve basis until we fill all available facilities on the Indiana campus in Bloomington. The limitation on delegates per lodge is necessary to give all lodges the opportunity to be represented.

Basis for attendance is as follows:

Up to 100 ----- 5 boys and 1 adviser
100 to 200 --- 10 boys and 2 advisers
200 to 400 --- 15 boys and 3 advisers
400 to 600 --- 20 boys and 4 advisers

Requests for additional space above the established quota will be dealt with individually. Exceptions may be made, if space is available, in consideration of the degree of lodge participation in conference program features. Every member of the delegation will be expected to contribute to the overall success of the program. If your delegates are serving as discussion leaders, Indian dance team members, on the conference committee, or producing an exhibit or other activity that makes attendance over the quota necessary, special consideration will be given.

Training To Be Featured

The training program at the 1969 conference will be designed to give the leaders information and inspiration they need to do effective jobs in their home lodges and chapters.

Every effort will be made to help local lodges meet the qualifications of a National Standard Lodge. One requirement is that your lodge will be represented at the national conference.

Preliminary registration forms will be mailed to councils this fall. Reservations to hold space will be accepted with a \$5 reservation fee for each delegate. Total conference fees will be around \$35.

The exact cost cannot be determined until after the area chiefs' planning meeting in December and adoption of the conference budget. Announcements regarding conference fees, program, and features will be sent to lodges soon after this planning meeting.

It is strongly recommended that each lodge appoint a 1969 national conference committee to start planning so that all lodges will be represented at Indiana University, August 23-26, 1969.

EDITORIAL by Scott Cooper


Dear Brothers:

ORDER OF THE ARROW AND BOYPOWER 176

Against the backdrop of a disturbed America, the Boy Scout movement has determined that more must be done to help the boys of today prepare themselves for citizenship in the years ahead."Americas manpower begins with BOYPOWER" -- and BOYPOWER begins with you.

Long-range plans are now being made to move ahead through the next 8 years to reach many more boys with a better quality program in Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, and Exploring. 1976 will mark the 200th anniversary of the United States of America. Scouting can make a great contribution to this celebration by achieving the goals that have been established in BOYPOWER '76, the B.S.A.'s new long-range plan.

The Order of the Arrow will play an important role in helping to make BOY-POWER '76 a reality. The "mission" of the Order is as follows:

- 1.To establish national standards for Order of the Arrow lodges and have at least 75 percent of them achieve these standards by 1976.
- 2.To make effective the purpose of the Order in emphasizing the ideals of the Boy Scout movement.
 - a.Recognizing those campers who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives.
 - b.Developing and maintaining camping traditions and spirit.
 - c.Crystalling the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of cheerful service to others.
- 3.To emphasize the main line purpose of the Order of the Arrow to promote, maintain, and support the outdoor program of Scouting.

To make the "mission" effective a "support package" has been drawn up. The main point of the "support package" is to help all Order of the Arrow lodges carry out the Onward Arrowmen Plan. A National Standard Order of the Arrow Lodge will be one that achieves the following goals by 1976:

- a.50 percent of total lodge membership to qualify as Brotherhood members.
- b.Camping promotion committee in each lodge to help carry out the council promotion plan.
- c.Hold an annual lodge (and chapter) officers' training conference.
- d.Have a current where-to-go-camping publication.
- e.Publish a regular (at least quarterly) bulletin or newsletter.
- f.Maintain current membership and financial records.
- g.Hold annual membership elections in every eligible unit.
- h.Have representatives attend national Order of the Arrow conference and area fellowship training conference.
- i.Place emphasis on the following
 objectives --
 - A Scout or Explorer today, a Scouter tomorrow.
 - 2. Advancement beyond First Class.
 - 3. Each Arrowman to recruit one new boy into Scouting annually.
 - 4. Correct wearing of the uniform through personal example.
 - 5. Perpetuate authentic American Indian culture and traditions.
 - 6. Improvement of Ordeal, Brother-hood, and Vigil ceremonies.
 - 7. Promotion of professional Scouting as a career.

In additon, plans are being made to improve our training program throughout the country at the lodge, area, region, and national levels. Special emphasis will be placed on the proper role of the adult in the Order of the Arrow as an adviser and "coach" to boys, to the end that boys will continue to manage the affairs and program of the Order.

National conferences are projected for 1969,1971,1973, and 1975.

In the years ahead the Order of the Arrow is challenged to help strengthen the Scout movement by encouraging advancement, promoting camping, holding the interests of boys in their own units, and helping new boys to join in the fun and

adventure of Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, and Exploring.

The future leadership of the Scout movement, to a large degree, will come from boys now active as Arrowmen.

The Order of the Arrow must meet the challenge of BOYPOWER '76 by making sure that every Arrowmen, every chapter, and every lodge is prepared to do their part.

This year, as in past years, our lodge is being run by a mere handful. Strangely enough, only a few new faces show up whenever we need help. The apathy is tremendous for a lodge of some 300 members. In other words, what the heck are you doing that's so important that you can't come to a board meeting or committee project to see what's going on?
