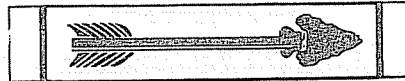

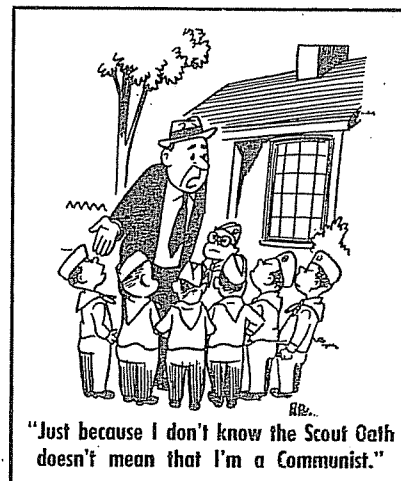
"WINTER ACTIVITY"

WORK TO DO

One of the basic purposes of the Order of
the Arrow is to promote Scout camping. We,
as members of the O.A. have this responsi-
bility toward our Troops. The boys in the
Troops must be encouraged or even pushed
into going to camp. This can be accomplished
by us as O.A. members through repeated ques-
tioning of the boys as to whether or not they
are going to camp.

Several weeks later a Council follow-up
committee will visit each Troop again to see
how camp sign-ups are going.

We need boys to help with this (and adults

The Order of the Arrow's Camp Promotions
Committee is going to visit each Troop in
the spring and talk about camp with the boys.
During this time movies and slides will be
shown of the camp. There will be an oppor-
tunity to have questions answered. Parents
will also be invited to these meetings.



A SCOUT'S REDEDICATION

The Order of the Arrow represents an
organization of Scouts dedicated to ser-
vice. It is an organization of honor camp-
ers, men and boys who not only work for
the Vigil Honor, but for their Lodge,
and for the Scouts who have not yet been
made members of the Order. You must
dedicate yourself to the lodge and to
accomplishing these things.

As a member of the O.A. I dedicate my-
self to service in the lodge. These
cannot be just words. They must be trans-
formed into actions. I intend to do just
that. Firstly, I believe that it is an
O.A. members duty to attend Fellowships
and work on the projects. Secondly, I
plan to become a member of one of the

help out by joining one of them. I can
say no more about what I intend to do,
but rather to show it through my actions.

ARROWMEN URGED TO RECRUIT
THEIR FRIENDS TO SCOUTING

Recent school surveys show that a great many boys who are not currently registered in the Boy Scouts of America would like to become Cub Scouts, Boy Scout, or Explorers. When these boys are asked, "Why don't you join?" their answer is often, "Because nobody ever asked me."

At present one out of every four boys of Scout age in the United States is a Scout. The BOYPOWER '76 plan calls for one out of every three to be a Scout by 1976. This means that we plan to reach over 6.5 million boys 8 years from now.

It also means that many more packs, troops, and posts must be organized to take care of this large increase in membership. It means that many summer camps must be enlarged and new camp properties acquired. It means that Order of the Arrow lodges will induct a great many more members.

When one thinks about all this, the question continues to come up, "What about all the guys who are ready to join right now?" These boys can't wait. An 11-year old with stars in his eyes who wants to be a Boy Scout will be 19 in 1976. A 14-year-old boy who wants to be an Explorer will be 22 and graduating from college.

Order of the Arrow members can practice the ideal of cheerful service to others by inviting their friends at school or in their neighborhoods to become Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, or Explorers.

It could be that the boys they help will one day be Arrowmen. It could be that Scouting becomes the turning point in the life of a boy, and he gets on the right trail instead of the wrong one.

Boys usually join Scouting because they have friends in a unit or someone invited them to visit a meeting -- they seldom go out knocking on doors to find the unit they want to join.

Our Onward Arrowmen Plan emphasizes the point that every Arrowman should recruit at least one new boy or one new Scouter a year. To achieve this, all we have to do is say, "Would you like to be a Scout?" When he says, "Yes," then you say, "Let me help you get started."

ON WOODCRAFT
by the Chief

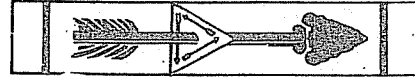
Scouting has changed a great deal since its founding. It has become civilized and not a thing born of the woods as originally intended. Twice in the past three years Scouts from the Evanston Council have been offered a chance to experience the kind of Scouting that Baden-Powell had known.

The Woodcraft Training Course is the only one of its kind offered in the country. It is unique because of the man who instructs it. The background of Mr. Bert Pullinger is one that could be divided between ten men and they would appear to be a head higher than anyone you or I are ever likely to meet.

Woodcraft is an advanced frontier training course. It offers logging, canoeing, and survival instruction on a level that is far above that of troop camping. It will be a two week course held on a river in northern Wisconsin, in the form of one continuous canoe trip. Three specialists in different phases of campcraft will accompany Mr. Pullinger to aid in the instruction program. Only 12 Scouts will be selected to attend this course and these will be required to attend three (3) preliminary training sessions held at the Scout Service Center.

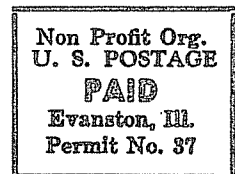
LODGE MEETING
